THE CONTENTS WILL REMAIN THE SAME, ALTHOLGH THE OUTSIDE MEASUREMENTS OF THE PAGES THEMSELVES WILL BE SMALLER. IN THIS MORE COMPACT SHAPE IT WILL BE MORE EASILY MAILED TO YOU AND MORE EASILY FILED BY YOU.

AS ALL OF YOU KNOW, POSTAL RATES HAVE RISEN AND ARE DUE FOR ANOTHER RISE, FOR THIS REASON, WHETHER OR NOT WE WENT INTO A PRINTED MEDIUM, OUR RATES, ALWAYS THE LOWEST ON THE MARKET, WOULD HAVE TO BE RAISED. BY DINT OF MUCH EFFORT AND FIGURING WE ARE MANAGING TO PAY THE NEW POSTAGE RATES AND THE NEW PRINTING AT AN INCREASE OF ONLY $50 \phi$ PER YEAR. THIS RATE INCREASE WILL BE EFFECTIVE JANUARY I, 1954. YOU HAVE UNTIL THAT DATE TO RENEW YOUR SUBSCRIPTION OR SEND IN THOSE GIFT SUBSCRIPTIONS AT THE OLD PRICE OF $\$ 2$ PER YEAR. YOU MAY RENEW YOUR

## MORE ABOUT OUR SAMPLE:

WE THINK THE WEFT YARNS :VE USED IN THIS MONTH'S SAMPLE ARE ESPECIALLY NICE AND SOME WHICH you will want to use in a variety OF WAYS. THEY ARE FLAT $1 / 64$ METALLIC, PLASTIC, SUPPORTED WITH NYLON DYED THE SAME COLOR AS THE METALLIC. THE DYE JOB IS SO EXcellent that the nylon is practically invisible but it is still THERE TO GIVE THE DESIRED SUPPORT. IT IS avallable in two shades of PINK, TWO SHADES OF BLUE, TWO SHADES OF GREEN, RED, COPPER, GOLD, AND SILVER. IT IS SMOOTH AND WORKS OUT VERY WELL. THERE ARE 350 Yards per spool and they sell for \$1 Each. the multicolORED METALLIC IS ACTUALLY FIVE OR SIX COLORS OF FINE METALLIC BRAIDED TOGETHER, WITH THE FINAL EFFECT MOSTLY OF SILVER WITH SPECKS OF THE OTHER COLORS. IT IS VERY LOVELY, BUT SOMEWHAT HEAVIER THAN the others described above, the NULTICOLORED BRAID IS \$1.25 PER SPOOL. ALL OF THESE MATERIALS are available at robin \& RUSS HAND:VEAVERS, 10 w. ANAPAMU ST., SANTA BAREARA, CALIFORNIA. TRY THEM, WE KNOW YOU WILL. LIKE THEM.

THIS MATERIAL USED FOR OUR TINY CHRISTMAS TREES, WAS VERY beautiful in the piece. the brown OF THE TRUNKS GAVE A NOT TOO OBVIOUS WARP STRIPE, AND THE RANDOM Changes of color in the weft were VERY LOVEIY. WE WOULD LIKE to see THIS IN A LAREE PIECE USED FOR A WALL HANGING DECORATION DURING THE holidays. IT WOULD also be very LOVELY FOR an evening jacket. of COURSE ANY SINGLE COLOR COULD BE EMPHASIZED IF PREFERRED. IF YOU ARE ONE OF THOSE LUCKY CREATURES W'HO HAS BOTH THE OCCASION TO WEAR an evening sheath and the figure ON WHICH TO PUT IT, THIS WOULD mAKE A MOST DRAMATIC SHEATH FOR AN EVENING GOWN. IF YOU USE IT IN THIS WAY, DRESS DOWN THE ACCESSOR-IES-BLACK VELVET WOULD PROBABLY BE YOUR BEST CHOICE.

MAKING YOUR CHRISTMAS CARD:
WE SUGGEST THAT THE FIRST
STEP IN MAKING THIS CARD IS TO SEE WHAT YOUR STATIONER OR PRINTER HAS AVAILABLE IN THE FORM OF SMALL ENVELOPES. SO MANY PEOPLE ARE MAKING THEIR OWN CARDS NOWadays that we have found that the STORES ARE CARRYING A BETTER LINE OF PLAIN CARDS AND ENVELOPES. SOMETIMES IT IS pOSSIble to buy plain white single or folded CARDS WITH MATCHING ENVELOPES. If YOU CAN't find these, buy the ENVELOPES AND CUT A SIZE OF COLORED PAPER TO FIT EITHER PLAIN OR FOLDED. WE LIKED THE APPEARANCE OF THE FOLDED ONE better. METALLIC PAPER WOULD LOOK WELL, but COLORED CONSTRUCTION PAPER does very well, less expensively. the wording can be your own if YOU DO NOT WISH TO FOLLOW OUR SIMPLE SUGGESTION. THE LINES FOR THE TREE TRUNK AND bASE ARE EASY TO DO WITH PEN AND INK, ALTHOUGH THOSE OF YOU NEAR A LARGE ART STORE MIGHT FIND A COLORED SEAL WHICH WOU'LD DO WELL FOR THE BASE. ON COLORED PAPER, WHITE INK LOOKS VERY WELL FOR THE LETTERING AND LINES, bUT OF COURSE YOU MAY HAVE SOME OTHER IDEA FOR an original color scheme. here IS THE BEST WAY to cut the trees to adVantage:


YOU WILL NOTICE THAT IN DOING this half the trees have the bROWN STRIPE DOWN THE CENTER; THE OTHER HALF THE BROWN TIPS ON THE OUTER MOST BRANCHES, WHICH IS ALL RIGHT IN EITHER CASE, IF PREFER-
RED, the brown stripe might be
OMITTED ENTIRELY, BUT WE LIKED

## WEAVERS! GIFT FOR THE CHURCH

WE KNOW FROM THE NUMBER OF QUESTIONS SENT IN TO THE EDITOR, THAT A FAVORITE PROJECT FOR THE HAND WEAVER IS THE MAKING OF A GIFT FOR THE CHURCH. THESE ARE MADE BY WEAVERS EVERYWHERE, OF ALL DENOMINATIONS. ALTAR CLOTHS, HANGINGS AND VESTMENTS ARE THE FAVORITE PROJECTS, AND THE CRAFTSMANSHIP SHOWN IS REMARKABLE IN MANY INSTANCES.

LINEN ALTAR CLOTHE WITH LAID IN MOTIFS OF RELIGIOUS SIGNIFI-. CANCE ARE PROBABLY THE FAVORITE OF THIS TYPE OF PROJECT. WE HAVE SEEN THESE BOTH OF ALL LINEN WITH LACE DECORATIONS, OR LINEN, SILK, RAYON, WOOL, OR A COMBINATION OF THESE WITH LACE WOVEN IN OR WITH DESIGNS LAID IN OF METALLICS OR COLORS. SILVER AND GOLD ARE THE MOST FREQUENTLY USED BECAUSE IT CAN BE MADE TO MATCH OTHER ALTAR ACCESSORIES. SOME CHURCHES LIKE THE TONE OF COPPER, ESPECIALLY IF THE RUGg FOR INSTANCE, IS RED BECAUSE IT HAS A WARMTH LACKING IN BOTH GOLD AND SILVER.

ONE WEAVER RECENTLY WOVE A HANGING TO FILL THE SPACE BEH:IND THE ALTAR IN A PROTESTANT CHUPCH. THIS PART ICULAR CHURCH WAS A SMALL ONE, NOT ORNATE IN ANY WAY, AND IT WAS FELT AT FIRST THAT AN? METALLIC MIGHT BE TOO TOO MUCH. HOWEVER, WHEN SAMPLES WERE PUT IN PLACE THERE WAS A UNANIMOUS GHOICE FOR A DARK WARM REDDISH TONE DRAPE OF COTTON AND WOOL? WITH SMALL ALMOST HIDDEN TOUCFES OF COPPER. IT SOUNDS VERY MODERN FOR A SMALL TRADITIONAL CHURCH BUT THE FINAL EFFECT WAS LOVELY AND NOT AT ALL INCONGRUOUS.

WE HAVE SEEN THE INTERIORS OF TWO BEAUTIFUL JEWISH SYNAGOGUES RECENTLY IN WHICH HAND WEAVING VIAS USED FOR THE DNTERIOR DECORATION. IN ONE THE ENTIRE THEME OF THE ROOM WAS BEIGE AND GOLD, AND THE DRAPERY MADE AN EXCELLENT BACKGROUND FOR THE RICHNESS OF THE OTHER FURNISTIINGS IN THE OTHER, THE CUFTAIN WAS MADE OF WOOL CARPETING, DECORATED WITH SYMBOLIC DESIGNS MADE OF COLORED WOOL AND METALLIC, WORKED IN A TECHNIQUE SIMILAR TO RUG HOOKING, WITH SOME OF THE LOOPS SHEARED.

WE FEEL OFTEN THAT THE POSSIBILITIES OF THE SIMPLEST THREADINGS ARE NOT FULLY ENOUGH EXPLORED, 30 WE WERE DELIGHTED TO RECEIVE TN THE MAIL RECENTLY A NEW LITTLE BOOK TITLED FOUR HARNESS HUCK. THE AUTHOR, EVELYN NEHER, IS A LONG TIME :VARP \& IVEF SUBSCRIBER, AND WE THINK THAT MANY OF OUR READERS COULD GET MUCH HELP FROM THIS LITTLE BOOK. IT IS PAPER BOUND, 42 PAGES CONTAINING OVER 100 PHOTOS.

THE BOOK OPENS WITH A SHORT HISTORY OF THE TERM HUCK, AND A DISCUSSION OF THE CHARACTERISTICS AND STRUCTURE OF THIS WEAVE. FOLLOWING IS A COLLECTION OF HUCK THREADING DRAFTS AND A COMPLETE OESCRIPTION OF THE WEAVING THEORIES INVOLVED. GENERAL DIRECTIONS FOR WEAVING WEFT FACED SPOTS, WARP FACED SPOTS, TURNED SPOTS (THOSE INVOLVING BOTH WARP \& WEFT) DOUBLE AND TRIPLE HUCK DESIGNS are Included.

PHOTOGRAPHS, THREADING, DRAFTS, AND TREADLING FOLLOW FOR ALL OVER HUCK SPOTS, THE COMBINAT ION OF HUCK WITH PLAIN WEAVE, AND REED PATTERNED HUCK WITH WHICH SOME INTERESTING AND QUICKLY WOVEN LACE EFFECTS CAN BE PRODUCED. THE BOOK CLOSES WITH I LLUSTRATIONS OF DOUBLE THREAD HUCK AND COLOR AND TEXTURE DESIGN IN THIS TECHNIQUE. IN SUMMARY ARE SOME SUGGESTIONS FOR WEAVING A SAMPLES BASED ON THE HUCK THEORY. THERE IS ALSO INCLUDED A COMPLETE BIBLIOGRAPHY FOR HUCK REFERENCE WHICH YOU WILL FIND HELPFUL, THIS BOOK MAY PROVE TO BE JUST THE THING YOUR STUDY GROUP IS SEARCHING FOR; IT COULD WELL. BE USED AS A TEXT AND GUIDEBOOK FOR SUCH A GROUP.

A READER SENT THIS NEWSPAPER CLIPPING, DATED 1849, IN MORRIS, ILLINOIS: IT IS ADVERTISING A PUBLIC SALE AND OFFERS "plenty of eats and drink" to ENTICE VISITORS TO THE AUCTION: AMONG THE ITEMS OFFERED FOR SALE ARE HIS SIX SLAVES, TWO MEN, TWO BOYS, ANG TWO WOMEN. THE CLIPPING READS IN PART:
"HAVING SOLD MY FARM AND AM LEAVING FOR OREGON TERRITORY BY OX TEAM, WILL OFFER ON MARCH I, 1849, ALL OF MY PROPERTY TOWIT: ALL OX TEAMS EXCEPT TWO TEAMS, BUCK AND BEN AND TOM AND JERRY; TWO MILK COWS; TWO SPINNING WHEELS; 30 POUNDS OF MUTTON TALLOW; ONE LARGE LOOM MADE BY JERRY WILSON; 300 HOOP PONES; ONE $40-$ GALLON COPPER STILL; THREE SCYTHES AND CRADLES; ONE 32-CALIBRE RIFLE, BULLET MOLD AND POWDER HORN; SIX HEAD OF FOX HOUNDS, ALL SOFT MOUTHED EXCEPT ONE."

＂recently 1 wove an all ANGORA SCARF FOR A GIFT．THE YARN WAS NOT EASY TO HANDLE，BUT THE FINISHED PRODUCT IS BEAUTI－ FUL．HOWEVER，I FIND THAT IT SHEDS DREADFULLY WHEN WORN WITH A DARK COAT，AND I AM ALSO WON－ DERING HOW THIS SCARF SHOULD BE CLEANED．＂

ANGORA IS A LUXURY FIBER， OBTAINED FROM THE ANGORA RABEIT． IT IS LUXURIOUS NOT ONLY BECAUSE OF ITS COST AND PLEASANT SOFT FEEL BUT ALSO BECAUSE IT MUST BE HANDLED WITH UTMOST CARE AT ALL TIMES．THERE IS NO WAY TO STOP OR ARREST THE SHEDDING OF FIBERS FROM ANY ALL－ANGORA FABRIC，OR EVEN FROM ONE CONTAINING A LARGE PERCENTAGE OF ANGORA YARNS． MANY WEARERS，HOWEVER，REGARD THIS DISADVANTAGE AS UNIMPORTANT WHEN THE BEAUTY，HIGH STYLE，AND PLEASANT HAND ARE TAKEN INTO CON－ SIDERATION．

THE NATIONAL INSTITUTE OF CLEANING AND DYEING ADVISE THAT ALL OR PART ANGORA ARTICLES SHOULD BE DRY CLEANED，AND THAT EVEN THEN THEY SHOULD HAVE SPEC－ IAL AND CAREFUL HANDLING．THE PHYSICAL STRUCTURE OF THE FIBER IS SUCH THAT IT WILL FELT VERY EASILY－－BY FELTING WE MEAN BECOME HARSH AND HARD WITH THE SLIGHT－ EST MECHANICAL ACTION．YOU SHOULD THEREFORE ENTRUST THIS SCARF TO ONLY THE VERY MOST CAP－ able and rel｜able cleaner．
