
NOVEMBER WORKSHOP

September 20th Board of Directors meeting

Voted to invite Jana Pavlova from Czechoslovakia to visit the U.S. WGM will write a letter of invitation to the Czech government asking permission for her to travel here.

Minnesota Weaver presented a financial report. A committee consisting of the Fiber Source Committee and Minnesota Weaver will make a report to the next Board meeting concerning Weaver advertising policy. Feasibility study to be made for a 40th Anniversary publication with a report due at the next Board meeting.

Irene Wood will be asked to continue her Minnesota Federation of Guilds project.

WGM received a grant from the Minnesota State Arts Board for an exhibit next March or April. Suzette Bernard wrote the grant proposal. Other grants will be applied for. This should help the Guild's immediate financial problem.

Donations will be asked of study groups which use the Guild rooms for their classes and meetings.

The Board will appoint an Alternate Income Source chairman to work on the question of Guild operating income. The Guild's savings account has been reduced to \$2400 by demands on it for current operating expenses. This trend must stop.

Please remember that ordering as a group is not like buying yarns off the shelf. You are trading immediate abailability for less cost.


Yarn Cupboard


The Faculty Exhibit currently on display at the Weavers Guild is an excellent example of the artistry, versatility, and skill of our teaching staff. Not only does the exhibit present a wealth of beautiful craftsmanship and information about the techniques and materials used, it gives biographical introductions to each of the exhibitors. And with interest in fiber art ranging from colonial coverlets to creative crochet, our faculty presents an impressive show.

Works were chosen by the teachers to reflect their courses at the Guild. A variety of handcrafted clothing appears throughout the show, the result of different approaches, different tools, and different processes. Hangings also appear utilizing a multitude of techniques: trapunto, bound weave, lkat, inlay, tapestry, warp painting. Samples of hand dyed and hand spun fibers, work sheets, and illustrations of steps in the design process accompany many of the displays. Guatemalan weaving, rugs, a Voyageur sash, a variety of twills, and even a pair of double weave dolls four feet high are among the items shown.

So if you have been having difficulty choosing from among the offerings in the Bulletin, a visit to the Faculty Exhibit could be very helpful. It will continue until November 2.

From November 12 - December 14 the Guild Exhibit will be Holiday Gifts. If you have a piece or pieces you would like to submit to this show, please bring them to the Guild by November 2, 9:30 A.M., when the Exhibits Committee will meet to organize the new exhibit. Gift items or items illustrative of techniques suitable to a variety of gifts will be considered. A 3 x 5 card with the name of the exhibit, your name, a description of the piece, its title, function, size, construction, and materials, and the insurance value (on the back of the card) should accompany the piece. 
Join a Guild?



Hilma Berglund Remembered

With the dedication of the new Hilma Berglund room at the American Swedish Institute this month, we are reminded of Miss Berglund's many contributions to the Guild — one can't even begin to list them all. She was instrumental in its founding, and served three times as its president during its history. She gave of herself wholeheartedly, and even at age 85, she kept active by weaving swatches for the Threadbender newsletter. Many of the samples, swatches and periodicals in the Guild library were donated by her. She is remembered by those who knew her for her kindness and patience. and her dedication to weaving, teaching, and to the Guild.

Although her mother was a weaver, Hilma Berglund did not learn herself until an art education class in college. A trip to Sweden in 1914 brought out her serious interest when she studied briefly at a weavers school in Stockholm. Her studies, interrupted by the war, were

completed on a return trip in 1922. She returned to Sweden frequently during her lifetime for pleasure and inspiration.

Miss Berglund was the weaving instructor in the Art Department of the University of Minnesota from 1933-1954. Among her many accomplishments, she invented a convertible floor/table loom, she designed the Guild logo, and she designed the house she lived in from 1941 until her death in 1972 at the age of 86.

A memorial fund was established in her name and used for improvements to the Library. Many of her belongings and weavings were bequeathed to the American Swedish Institute, and we look forward to seeing them displayed there in the room dedicated November 1 as a memorial



Fine Hand Made Spool Racks and Raddles.




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During my stay in the Midwest, I was fortunate to travel to many rural towns to give workshops. Without access to classes, these self-reliant spinners and weavers have learned primarily by trial and error. Being a student of error myself, I can appreciate the long hours that have gone into mastering techniques.

I have enjoyed corresponding and exchanging ideas with many of the people AI and I met while traveling. I would like to share with you the work and thoughts of some of these talented women.

This month I'd like to introduce you to a very special spinner from Wausau, Wisc. Her letters have been wonderful reminders to me of how healthy it is to have a good laugh on oneself every now and then. So here she is, the Erma Brombeck of fiber arts, Sue John.

In hopes of saving some other poor artist-craftman from suffering the same affliction as I....I am going public with mine. I suffer from neomechanophobia (better understood as an irrational fear of new equipment). I am not sure you would consider a spinning wheel in my possession for 2 1/2 years new, but it was simply because I hadn't used it.

How could 11 1/2 pounds of wood put me into such a panic....making me a quivering mass on inadequate jelly? My feelings of inadequacy go back a long way and there is no point in boring you or me with the details. My interest was and is in a cure. A rational approach to any problem is helpful. It has a way of putting difficulties into perspective.

- 1. In analysis a spinning wheel is just pieces of wood, metal and a bit of leather put all together.
- 2. It cannot possibly possess intellect....certainly no more intellect than I.
- 3. A wheel cannot judge me or my spinning abilities.
- 4. It is, after all, a tool at my disposal. I bought it, not it me.
- 5. In these days of inflation who wants to spend money just to feel a classic case of guilt and inadequacy.

The wheel was and is equipment purchased for my pleasure. The only intimidating factors associated with it were the imaginary ones I imposed on it. I did eventually sit down with my wheel to push myself to spin — creating that thick, thin, break yarn familiar to....yes....all beginners. Something I wasn't willing to be....a beginner. I wanted to start off advanced. You know, at the eat-your-heart-out-Rumpelstiltskin-level. I just had to take time out to be a beginner.

Is my neomechanophobia cured? There is a bit of discomfort in the answer....no. You see, it takes me 2 to 3 months to warp my new contramarche loom. I can't believe that is normal. I'm not sure where the cure lies, but I have a feeling the distance I must put between new

equipment and used equipment is in the willingness to be a beginner and to make mistakes....as many as it takes to gain experience and confidence from.

I am less concerned about my phobia, because I licked it once. And someday soon, I hope, I will be able to approach my loom as I do my wheel.....as a friend.

QUESTIONS AND ANSWERS

What is the best wood for spinning wheels?


Rather than a specific type of wood, it is most important to have wood that has been properly kiln dried so the wood will be stable in your home. We would select Black Cherry, Walnut, or Red Oak because they can be finished without stains. This is a personal preference. Many wheels are stained no matter what wood is used. Rather than a specific type of wood, I would be careful to select a wheel having a smooth finish.

What are your favorite woods?

In order of preference we would choose Black Cherry and Red Oak. Both can be finished with a natural clear finish, and both have good grain patterns. For heavy craft equipment such as looms we would probably choose Red Oak because it is more easily available in 2" by 2" lumber. For spinning wheels we prefer Cherry because the close grain allows for easier cleaning.

Why don't you make spinning wheels out of walnut?

Kiln dried and steamed walnut is an excellent wood for fine furniture and craft equipment. We do not use it because its sawdust is irritating to us. Many of the exotic woods have this problem of making breathing uncomfortable.
